For our May meeting, we are going to shake it up a bit. Instead of Tuesday May 2nd, we will move the meeting to Saturday, May 6th at Riverside State Park Equestrian Area. There will be a potluck at 5PM; Ponderosa will provide the main dish, and members can bring sides. Meeting presentation will start at 6PM around the campfire, and Linda White will be our guest speaker, enlightening us about an unplanned night in the wilderness... Not that anyone ever gets lost... We will also have a short presentation from SLEET, the Spokane Livestock Emergency Evacuation Team.



Beyond our regular meeting activities, we'd like to make the experience a bit more special. We encourage members to come on Saturday morning and ride the new trail to be used at the Poker Ride. This will be a guided ride with Patty Wright, starting around 11:30AM.

Since the weather forecast looks awesome, this is an ideal time to have a campout. For those who enjoy camping, please reserve a spot at the Riverside SP Equestrian Camp. GAIA GPS is FREE and is easy to use. We will go over the basic features while we are heading down the trail. It is pretty easy stuff, and it will help you a bunch on future outings in unknown places! GAIA training will happen at **9 30 AM**.

State Parks Commissioners Meeting By Ken Carmichael

Washington State Parks are managed by a seven-person commission appointed by the governor. They meet approximately seven times a year around the state. Laurie Connelly is the Commissioner from the Spokane area.

In April they met in Spokane. This gives us a chance to meet with them, show them key areas of the parks and give them our point of view. This year I was with them on three different occasions.

On their first day, Tuesday, they toured different areas of Riverside State Park. I met with them while at the Carlson Trailhead looking at the Troutman Property. I was able to point out the parking problems at that trailhead.

That evening the Riverside State Park Foundation, which I am a member of, co-hosted a wine and snacks gathering of Commissioners, park staff from Olympia and key people in the area. I was able to talk to each Commissioner individually. Three commissioners are new since their last visit here so this was a good opportunity.

At the Commission Public Meeting I was able to address them in a formal setting plus have an opportunity to talk to them, and staff, individually again.

These opportunities add up to making contacts with decision makers. They are the people that can make a difference in the recreational use of our parks.

Rustler's Gulch Report

NEBCHW Trail Condition Report for **April 5, 2023**, for Rustlers Gulch, <u>Holly Road via the Lower Trail & Return to Holly Rd</u>. Lately the weather has been sunny in the morning and overcast in the afternoon which is the time we get on the trails. Not surprising, as far as snow melt, that hasn't changed much from my April 3 recon report. Generally, the snow patches are diminished and fewer. We took the left at the gate by the Preifert barn as before. The only place that presented some difficulties for our horses was the heavily wooded section. The snow is deepest there. We can now see that some downed branches are underneath. There was no ice but just a little scrambling in the various snow depths.

After this section Sister Sue on Bella and I on my trusty bay, Truth, took the lower trail between the two rocks rather than going up the hill. We were surprised to find less snow and larger stretches of bare ground. The marsh was off to our left. No geese this time but the spring peeper frogs were croaking like crazy. They sing in choruses of three believe it or not. We

stayed straight at the first intersection rather than taking a wide left going down the hill. The next intersection had a right which went down to the first river crossing near the swimming hole. Instead, we went straight around a tree that fell last year leaving lots of dead branches close to the trail edge. There were a couple of small trees crossing the trail at chest level but we muscled through them.



We continued along the trail and came across the tree which has stretched high over the trail for several years now. It is easy to just duck a little to get under it. Having 15 HH or less horses helps. Ok. How long before it breaks and falls. I vote for taking it down before someone gets hurt. Next was a narrow alley between a jam-packed row of small alder trees on the right and pines on the bank on the left. These alders will not be hard to remove but unfortunately, they will grow back quickly. At the old blown down tree on the right, take the trail to the left and continue left at the next intersection to be on your way back to Holly Road Trailhead. My Garman malfunctioned so I estimate we went about 6.6 miles total since our pace included some gating by Bella and trotting by Jade. We now have three big trees that will require removal by our sawyers. I am hoping that we can start working on these big trees by the end of the third week or the last week in April.



Newsletter Theme: Birds, Bees, Flowers, Trees

The theme is about things we see on the trail, especially animals and plants. I found some pictures in internet-land, with some links where you can learn more about the flora and fauna in the Pacific Northwest.

Bees:

Pollinators include bees, moths, flies, beetles, wasps, desert bats, hummingbirds, and butterflies. Pollinators are critical for earth's ecosystems because they make it easier for plants to reproduce. (https://www.spokanecounty.org/DocumentCenter/View/10381/EnviroKidsSpring2016?bidId=)

Flowers:

Western serviceberry flower and leaf pollinated by a green metallic sweat bee (Photo and caption from:

http://www.bentler.us/easternwashington/plants/shrubs/serviceberry-bush.aspx). Notice the leaf of the serviceberry, the back part of the oval has a smooth edge. The front part has saw teeth.



Birds:

I love birds but I'm not a very good birder, and also not a very good photographer. I use an app on my phone to help identify birds, called Merlin

(https://merlin.allaboutbirds.org/). It can do sound recordings and tell me what birds are calling. Here is a not-so-great picture of a magpie in a Ponderosa Pine. How do I know it's a Magpie? Because they are very distinctive and large and easy to see. How do I know it's a Ponderosa pine? See tree information below.

Trees on the Trails

Think of this 4-page insert as your "cheat sheet" for the trees most often found along Washington's trails. Within, you'll find both conifers and flowering deciduous trees found everywhere from lowland forests to subalpine summits. Some of these trees are common west of the crest of the Cascades, while others are found only east of the crest. A few (such as Douglas-fir) are found on both sides of the divide.

A few tips to help you identify trees: Study the needles or leaves. What do the cones look like? Is the bark smooth, rough or papery? We've tried to picture both the overall tree and a detail such as cones or needles to help you identify the tree.

Other clues to consider: Where is the tree? Does the tree prefer higher elevations? Does it thrive east of the crest? Does it crave shade or open sunlight?

And last, some trees are tricky to tell apart. Some firs can't be distinguished unless you examine the cones (which stay high in the tree and rarely fall!). So have fun, and don't be too disappointed if you can't get a positive I.D. on that mystery tree.



Ponderosa pine

Pinus ponderosa

Distinctive, reddish-barked pine common in open parklands east of the crest. Needles come in sets of three.



Lodgepole pine

Pinus contorta

Found west of crest (where it's known as shore pine) and in eastern Cascades in abundance. Needles come in sets of two.



Western white pine

Pinus monticola


Once common, populations were decimated by a disease introduced in 1910. Large cones, needles in sets of five.



Whitebark pine

Pinus albicaulis

A subalpine pine found east of the Cascade crest. Clark's nutcrackers eat and disperse seeds. Needles in sets of five.



Douglas-fir

Pseudotsuga menziesii

Abundant tree in both western rain forests and in drier forests east of the crest. Old-growth trees can reach 300 feet tall.

Western hemlock

Tsuga heterophylla

Second only in abundance to Douglas-fir in westside forests below 3,500 feet, this tree is very shade tolerant.



Mountain hemlock

Tsuga mertensiana


Distinguished from western hemlock by its larger cones and presence at higher elevations (generally above 4,500 feet).

This juniper tree was 'my tree' while hiking on a trail in Arizona. She kept calling to me with her energy, where I ended up taking lots of photos of every angle she presented to me. She had a story to tell of her survival, plus much more.



I see many bald eagles on my trail rides. This young juvenile was hopping down a rock embankment to reach the cool water for a toe dip.



Well-known bear grass on a ride at Mt. Spokane. I photographed the bloom in late July, and almost missed it. Bloom time is influenced by moisture and temperature. Bears do not eat the blooms, but do use the plants later in the year for bedding.





Although the above photos were not on the trail, I see the honey bees and white crowned sparrows outside and everywhere. During the extremely hot summer, the bees would line the bird bath for a cool drink. They would stay for hours, sometimes more than 50 lined up, landing on the edge of the bath enjoying the coolness.

The white crowned sparrows were migratory, and only appeared at the bath during late spring. However, due to the unusual weather patterns, they were appearing frequently for a cool bath. They were hot!



Bitterroot was spotted at the south end of Fishtrap Lake. It is one of my favorite plants; the color is stunning. Native American tribes in this region used the roots for food or trade.

Non-Motorized Vehicles on the Trails?





CURRENT CORONAVIRUS RESTRICTIONS WILL BE IN FORCE FOR YOUR SAFETY

Many of you have attended the Ponderosa Scavenger Hunt or Poker Ride so some of this may be repetitive. However, we want everyone to understand the event so you can maximize the great time you will have on **Sunday, May 21.**

KIDS (17 AND UNDER) RIDE FREE. THIS IS A FAMILY EVENT AND WE ENCOURAGE KIDS ON HORSEBACK.
HOWEVER, THEY ARE NOT ELIGIBLE TO WIN PRIZES

- The event will be at the Riverside State Park Equestrian Area, same as for the scavenger hunt.
- Camping is available in the developed campground and overflow area. Make your camping
 reservations through the State Parks reservation system www.parks.state.wa.us/223/reservations.or
 call 888-226-7688.
- Either a Discover Pass (Day or Annual) or camping permit is required. For a list of Discover Pass vendors go to https://www.discoverpass.wa.gov/133/where-t-buy. To purchase on-line go to https://store.discoverpass.wa.gov/. You may purchase a Day Pass at registration.
- We start the day at registration near the announcers stand where both pre-registered and those registering at the event sign in. You receive your playing card here.
- Also, at registration you may purchase additional poker hands. It is like playing multiple bingo cards for additional chances of winning at poker.
- After registering join us in the gathering area to purchase raffle tickets for some great items and play the first card of your poker hand. You can also purchase a poker ride T-shirt and Riverside State Park map. Then you are on the trail any time you want between 9:00 and 11:00 am. Poker games close at 2:00 PM so please be back to the gathering area by then.
- We ask that you do NOT run your horses. We know this is fun, but we have many people on the trail and we need to be respectful of the reaction horses have when they see other horses running. This is not a timed event. **Thank you**.
- You will be riding with your friends in a designated area following a trail well marked with engineer tape at your own speed (but remember no running).
- In playing the poker ride game you are trying to get the best, or worst poker hand. You do this by stopping at "game stations" along the trail to play a "game of skill." This determines the next card in your hand. The "game of skill" is tossing a bean bag at a board lined with a deck of cards. Where your bean bag lands determines your playing card. You may remain mounted or dismount.
- There are three "game stations" along the trail.
- Return to the gathering area to play the last card of your hand by 2:00 PM, purchase that last minute T-shirt and park map and check the winner's board to see what raffle items you may have won.
- Relax and enjoy a box lunch if you desire.
- Raffle tickets are drawn at 11:00. Raffle tickets must be purchased before 11:00 AM.
